1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

The college is established in 2006 by the Government of Gujarat for the benefits of students of tribal area. Most of the people in this region are doing farming. People could not afford to send their children to cities for higher education. The college caters educational to the poor students of taluka. The college is located near to the National Highway and connected with the nearby villages. Area of college campus is 2.076 and built-up area is 5079 meters.

The institute runs four undergraduate courses and one Postgraduate course as below:

- 2. Chemistry
- 3. Botany
- 4. Mathematics

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

Aim of our college to empowering rural area students of South Gujarat through higher education by Imparting them opportunities of Best Employees. Our Institution has limited flexibility in Implementations of the Curriculums because our college is affiliated to VNSGUni Surat. the College has followed the syllabus prescribed by the university for the Courses offered in BSc & MSc. The principal and the other faculty are member of BOS committee they represent themselves on BOS and made a positive Impart in the work of curricular planning and upgrading. For implementation of college schedule, we follow University academic calendar. Our college organise various extension and co-curriculum activities for self-development of students. Our target to give a Quality Education so we Arranged expert lecture for Third year students. For effective learning we apply new e- resources method for teaching.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

Field visits, study tour and industrial visits, etc. are used to enhance learning experience of students. Admissions are made as per the guidelines of the state government, Gujarat. 88% students were enrolled in the last five years against the sanctioned seats. Out of which, 87% students of reserved category were admitted. Seminars and Clube activities are carried out to increase students' interest in Subject. These activities also increase their confidence and help to remove their stage fear. The full-time teaching staff is well qualified. Out of 12 full time teachers, 7 hold Ph.D. degree. Techers are using ICT to enhance the learning efficiency of students.

Grievances related to exam are redressed according mechanism decided by Institute. Academic calendar is prescribed by the university and exams are conducted as per the same calendar. Program Outcomes and Course Outcomes of all the courses are stated and displayed on the website.

Research, Innovations and Extension

Institute does not have any University approved research centre of the affiliating University or any other agency, there is no separate research committee as such, but Faculty of the institute participated in many seminars and present the research paper. We have an internal academic committee which is work about organizing research seminars, at our institute. In the institute many faculty members are Ph.D. holders and they regularly share their research knowledge and encourage research activities with the students. In this way research atmosphere is created in the institute. Currently there is not any research projects are going-on. But the Institute encourages students and faculty to involve in research activities. To create the zeal among students and teachers, college has procured latest equipments, updated the library and laboratory facility. The institute motivates the students for higher education; the staffs are always on its toes when it comes to encouraging the students to join higher education for research. To develop scientific temper and aptitude, the Institute arranges Expert's lectures, industrial visits, study tours and visit to higher learning institute regularly. Despite its unavailability of a research centre, the faculty keeps on inviting experts on various subjects to deliver guest lectures to the students of both UG and PG level. Faculty members also brief the students regarding the work presented by other researchers in the same event. By doing so, they get the students idea about the current scenario of research in their subject.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

Government Science College, Chikhli was established in 2006, its campus spread across an area of 0.84 acre and the present constructed area stands at 5079 square metres. The overall infrastructure has been gradually developed over the years in accordance with the needs of the students seeking quality education at affordable rates. The college has two floors consisting of ten classrooms two of which are ICT enabled and four laboratories (Chemistry, Botany, Physics, and Computer). Sports facility is provided in the form of gym equipments and equipments of other sports. The infrastructure augmentation budget for the last five years has been in proportion to the immediate needs of learning and physical infrastructure. The library caters to the needs of students and teachers and is updated when required and enough budget is allocated for buying books and subscriptions. The college has installed CCTV cameras for monitoring and surveillance. ICT enabled classes and a Dell Language lab with internet connectivity has also been provided.

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Student Support and Progression

Majority of the students of this institution belongs to Scheduled Tribe and Socially and Educationally Backward category. The government provides scholarships and freeships to the needy students. During the last five years, the number of students benefited by the government schemes are 2205. The number of students enrolled in capability enhancement schemes such as Competitive Examination Cell and Career Cancelling Cell is 1664. The Career Guidance Cell provides support services to students on regular basis. Progression to higher education is an issue, more than 20% students have opted master's degree courses in previous graduating batch. The institute encourages the students to participate in University level sports tournaments and cultural activities. Moreover, the Sports Week of the institution and Saptdhara Activities are on regular basis.

Governance, Leadership and Management

The college is a government college which comes under the control of Commissionerate of Higher Education, Government of Gujarat. To achieve vision and mission of the institution, different bodies of college work enthusiastically in a well-planned manner. The college being a government organisation, no fund is collected from non- government bodies, individuals and philanthropists and no fund is given to any faculty for attending conference or workshop, but principal and other staff encourage faculty members to do research work. To improve teaching-learning process, feedback from students are collected and analyzed, and on that basis, better teaching strategies are developed. The college has effective internal quality assurance cell (IQAC) which works for enhancing quality of teaching. College confers an award of excellence to meritorious students as encouragement. The college conducted academic and administrative audit (AAA) in 2013-14.

- There are many innovative practices introduced by the college in areas of teaching-learning, governance and for the improvement in the quality of the overall processes.

1.1.1 The institution ensures effective curriculum delivery through a well planned and documented process

Response:

Our College is affiliated to the Veer Narmad South Gujarat University, hence we follow the university designed curriculum. The college operates at UG & PG level. Our college is located in tribal area so most of our students are from underprivileged backgrounds who are seeking employment. Our goal is to make these students employable for nearby Industrial clusters and Government jobs. The University prepares an academic calendar that specifies the duration of the semester, the date of commencement and end of semesters. All UG and PG courses offered by the college follow semester system. In the beginning of the academic year, an action plan is prepared by the IQAC/HOD. Separate time table for each Department and other programmes are prepared. Theory & Practical classes are held according to the time-table which is prepared prior to the commencement of the academic year by the Routine Committee and which is published on noticeboard. Teaching is according to paper wise curriculum. If there is necessity to complete the curriculum extra classes are conducted. At the end of each academic session, the students appear for the semester examination. For developing their skills to compete in the 'job market' we offer Skill Development programme like Finishing School to our students. Most of the departments have their own computers with internet connectivity. The teachers download Bisag video lectures or use topic wise Bisag lecture CDs from library for ICT lectures in classes. The use of ICT, laptop, well equipped laboratory facilitates etc. are made available to students to improve their performance. In order to enhance learningteaching process our visiting faculty maintains lesson plan diary. Relevant text books, reference books and practical charts are issued from library to teachers and students. PG students get more benefits with reference books. All our laboratories are upgrade every year as per the requirement of syllabus. The feedback on curriculum is taken by our college and conveyed to university by our member in Board of Studies. The college encourages faculty members to attend Orientation/ Refresher courses, workshops and present papers in seminars conducted by the affiliate and other Universities for acquiring necessary skills for effective delivery of the curriculum. Different department arranges education tour/field visit to develop observation skill among the students.

2.2 Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 The institution assesses the learning levels of the students, after admission and organises special programs for advanced learners and slow learners

Response:

Majority of students come from tribal areas and belong to first generation of learner. Majority of the tribal students are comfortable in regional language of Gujarati while their comprehension and communication in English language is very weak. The state Government has started an initiative SCOPE [Society for Creation of Opportunity through Proficiency in English], which helps students to increase their understanding and proficiency in English. For computer literacy, Dept. of Higher Education has started initiative of DELL Lab [Digital English Language Laboratory]. For development of soft skills of students, government has started a programme of Finishing School.

Slow learner and advanced learners are identified by teachers from class room lecture, discussion and marks obtained in Internal Exam. Slow learners and advanced learners are easily identified during their practical session, in which they have to apply their theoretical knowledge in respective experiments.

- •Some difficult concepts which are difficult to grasp for slow learners, are repeated in consequent classes.
- •Assignment has been given to slow learners.
- •Slow learners are counselled by the respective subject teacher.

Advance learners are motivated to appear for competitive exams and for these purpose the college library is also well equipped with books related to general knowledge, computer facility with internet connection and Wi-Fi connectivity.

2.5.1 Reforms in Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level

Response:

- •The semester system with CGPA pattern has been adopted by VNSGU in 2011-12. Now the university has moved one step ahead with Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) in UG program.
- •Head of the institution and HOD are in regular touch with the students. They have their own mechanism to collect information either directly or indirectly or confidentially. Continuous evaluation from both the sides taking place in our college.
- •Students are evaluated by classroom participation, assignments and Internal Exam.
- •The internal marks are provided on the basis of internal test, assignment, attendance and viva (in practical).
- •Different committees have been formed to supervise and look after activities of the college. Our cultural activities called Saptadhara, in which students are encouraged to take participation in at least one 'Dhara'.

- •Internal assessment is of 20 marks while external assessment is of 50 marks. Continuous internal evaluation is transparent and robust. Any doubt about the optimal answers of the question is clarified by the examiners.
- •After internal assessment, marks are displayed on the notice board before submitting to the University and students are given freedom to ask for the answer book if they are unsatisfied with assessment.
- •Any complaint regarding internal assessment, students can contact subject related Departmental Head. Departmental Head conveys the oral or written complaint to the concerned subject teacher. The grievance is resolved by the concerned subject teacher and head of the department after discussing it with the Principal. If there is any error in the assessment, corrections are accordingly made by the examiner and the corrected marks are officially posted against the name of the concerned students.

2.5.3 Mechanism to deal with examination related grievances is transparent, time-bound and efficient

There are stages to redress any grievances related to examination.

- 1.For internal exam and 2. For university exam
- 1.For internal exam:

After displaying the marks on the notice board, students are free to contact subject related Departmental Head for any doubts regarding the assessment. Departmental Head conveys the complaint to the concerned subject teacher. The grievance is resolved by the concerned subject teacher and head of the department after discussing it with the Principal. If there is any error in the assessment, corrections are accordingly made by the examiner and the corrected marks is officially posted against the name of the concerned student. Grievance is resolved within time period of three days. Same mechanism is followed for any grievance regarding assignments, attendance and other departmental activities.

2. For University examination:

To resolve the grievances of the students regarding the assessment, the university has framed the rules and regulation. After declaration of the results, the dates for re-evaluation which are provided by the university are displayed on the notice board for the information of the students. Students have the rights of re-evaluation.

2.5.4 The institution adheres to the academic calendar for the conduct of CIE

•The academic calendar is designed in a way so that that there should be maximum working days to complete the syllabus. The university provides an academic calendar that specifies the date of beginning

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and end of the classes for each semester along with the government holidays.

The institute motivates the students for higher education; the staff is always on its toes when it comes to encouraging the students to join higher education for research. To develop scientific temper and aptitude, the Institute arranges Expert's lectures, industrial visits, study tours and visit to higher learning institute. The college does not have a registered research centre of the affiliating university. Despite its unavailability of a research centre, the faculty keeps on inviting experts on various subjects to deliver lectures to the students of both UG and PG level. The college is predominantly under-graduate with only one postgraduate Department (Botany). There is no recognized Incubation centres associated with any business start-up. But the college plays an encouraging role in promoting an ecosystem for innovation among the faculty members. If any research grants are sanctioned for the projects by research agencies then full support will be provided to the principal investigator to implement the research scheme within the time frame work.

The college has adopted practical approach in recent years to keep the students on par with the latest developments in their respective fields of study.

- Many of the class rooms of the college are equipped with LCD projectors to facilitate learning for the students.
- Separate, well equipped labs are set up for the students in sciences, computer and the English language to make the students acquainted with the latest trends in respective fields and improvise on them.
- The computer science students choose an area of interest of their own preference and do a mini project as fulfilment for the degree of BSc with computer science.

Criterion 4 - Infrastructure and Learning Resources

4.1 Physical Facilities

4.1.1 The institution has adequate facilities for teaching- learning. viz., classrooms, laboratories, computing equipment, etc.

Response:

The college was established in 2006 in a modest manner and over the course of a decade has developed proportionally with the demand of times. The college campus is spread over an area of 0.84 acre with a total constructed area of 5079 square metres. The college started with undergraduate courses in Botany, Chemistry, Computer Science and today also offers post graduate learning in Botany.

The use of Chalk and Talk method alongside Digital mode is practiced in our college. There are 10 fully equipped and functional classrooms. There are 4 fully equipped laboratories. We have 5 classrooms and 1 seminar hall equipped with LCD Projector. All classrooms and laboratories have WiFi facility. There is a Dell Language Lab consisting of 25 computers with internet connectivity and an LCD TV Screen which caters to the IT needs of the students. Printing, scanning and photocopying facilities is also available.

Chemistry lab is situated on the first floor and adequately ventilated. It is divided in three sections i.e.1] Physical Chemistry Laboratory with strength of 27 students, 2] Organic/Inorganic Chemistry Laboratory with a strength of 32 students 3] Common Laboratory with strength of 64 students. Each section is well ventilated and exhaust systems are in place along with first aid. The laboratory is equipped with pH meter, conductometer, potentiometer, polarimeter, colorimeter, refrectometer, viscometer and high precision weight balance. There is a common storeroom for chemicals and glassware which also includes a refrigerator for cold storage.

There are two Biology laboratories on the first floor. They are equipped with various plant and animal specimens. Equipments include centrifuge, steady laminar flow, incinerator, a refrigerator, water bath, soil thermometer, digital colorimeter, pH meter, prismatic compass, digital balance, camera lucida rain gauge, luxmeter, micrometer, microtome, herbarium pressure, colony counter, haemocytometer, photosynthometer and oven. Types of microscope include binocular microscope, compound microscope and dissecting microscope. Physics lab is situated on the ground floor which has related instruments like spectrometer, ammeter, voltmeter, etc.

The college has a Wi-Fi enabled Computer lab as well as DEL Lab. The Computer lab is exclusively used by Computer Science students while DEL Lab is open to other students. The college is a centre for SCOPE (online) exam which is conducted in the Dell Lab. College library consists of more than 3000 books, educational magazines which the students and staff utilize.

4.1.2 The institution has adequate facilities for sports, games (indoor, outdoor),gymnasium, yoga centre etc., and cultural activities

Response:

In keeping with the view of holistic development of students, along with academics it also aims to provide

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and sustain their physical and mental health.

The college has a playground where court level sports are organised. Badminton and volleyball matches and tournaments have been held here. The gym room has sports utilities for students which includes body building equipments like dumb bells, exercise rods, rubber plates. Indoor sports equipments include that of table tennis, badminton, carom, chess and outdoor sport equipments of cricket (practice nets, helmets, arm guard, leg pads, chest guard and gloves), hockey (hockey sticks and ball), volleyball (ball and net) and khokho poles, shot put, discus are also available. Archery kit is also available along with miscellaneous equipments like marking machine, measure tape, whistle, scorebook, cones.

Students have got opportunities to participate in inter collegiate tournaments and have achieved laurels for the college especially in Archery.

Cultural activities like Annual Day and Sapta-dhara also plays an important role in shaping the personalities of students. Sapta-dhara is a weeklong cultural fest which includes various competitions like essay writing, poster making, slogan writing, *mehendi* design competition, *rangoli* completion, classroom decoration.

4.3 IT Infrastructure

With a view to ease the access and dissemination of information the campus is equipped with NaMo Wi-Fi which is aimed primarily for students. NaMo Wi-Fi has 7 routers for maximum coverage.

The college is also connected to GTPL Broadband connection which is primarily used by teaching and non teaching staff for research, teaching and administrative purpose. Wi-Fi connection is also made available through 5 routers connected to the broadband.

The college has a broadband connection of 8 MBPS and has aWi-Fi enabled Computer lab as well as DEL Lab which caters to the IT needs of the students. The Computer lab is exclusively used by Computer Science students while DEL Lab is open to other students. The college is a centre for SCOPE exam which is conducted in DEL Lab every year.

The College being wholly governmental, the grant for maintenance of infrastructure is provided directly by Government of Gujarat and no private funding is accepted.

Physical facilities like classrooms, laboratories and seminar hall is used appropriately. Maintenance of cleanliness is regular and security is of paramount concern with CCTV cameras and security guard. Parking space is available for staff and students. Ramp is available on the ground floor. Girls room was made as per IQAC recommendation.

Classrooms have white board and as green boards; at least half of the existing classrooms have overhead projectors. Teachers are encouraged to use digital modes to enhance the overalllearning-teaching experience.

Laboratories are maintained in order and all essential consumables are procured timely for smooth functioning of practical.

Students are encouraged to use the library which is well maintained with books, magazines and subscriptions fulfilling immediate and long term academic needs of students.

The college with its gymkhana room provides necessary sports leisure and related activities and sports equipment while the ground doubles up as a space court for volleyball games and cricket practice pitch.

The college has sufficient computers to cater to IT needs, with the Computer Lab and Digital English Language Lab forming the bulk of the IT ecosystem that is connected to internet by broadband and Wi-Fi. NaMo Wi-Fi is exclusively for students and can be accessed from any place in the college building.

6.2.4 Effectiveness of various bodies/cells/committees is evident through minutes of meetings and implementation of their resolutions

All the functioning bodies in the college works under supervision of the Principal of the college. The meetings are held regularly to implement the policies and achieve the responsibilities. The committee members act as a team to execute assigned task. One of the activities successfully implemented is "UDISHA Seminar".

The Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) has suggested many improvements in academic field by which students can be benefitted. There are ten classrooms and one seminar hall which are ICT enabled, which help students for better learning with scope of recent trends. Regular Industrial visits/field trips are also arranged for final year students for better understanding of current trends in their respective fields.

In the year 2016-17, Dr. Divyesh Gandhi of Naranlala College-Navsari gave guidance related to career opportunities on 30 March, 2017 to the final year students under "UDISHA Prakalp" Scheme. A total of 97 students were benefited from this seminar. In the year 2017-18, Dr. Dipesh Shah from Vapi Science College and Dr. Chetanbhai Soni from Vivo Health Care (Ahmedabad), gave guidance related to career advancement to the final year students of sciences. Total 54 students were benefited from this seminar.

- IQAC encourages live example learning by promoting industrial/field visits for students.

IQAC also encourages teacher to apply Minor and Major Research Project and Grant permission for Orientation, Refresher and Faculty Development Program.

6.5.2 The institution reviews its teaching learning process, structures & methodologies of operations and learning outcomes at periodic intervals through IQAC set up as per norms

Response:

Under the IQAC, student feedback verbally collected during academic year and written feedback

are collected at the end of each academic year. The analysis of effectiveness of teaching is made through student feedback mechanism. Student learning process is reviewed through class tests, assignments, class seminars, projects and internal assessment tests. University result analysis is made for each semester at the department level and college level. This helps in identifying the slow and fast learners. IQAC of the College has devised a mechanism to organize remedial lectures for slow learners and promote advanced learners by sending them to various competitions, seminars, workshops and conferences.

The college is proud to say that minimal waste is generated in the campus. Waste generated in the campus is segregated as e-waste, liquid waste /organic and solid waste.

Solid waste management

The College has a suitable waste management system for safe disposal of toxic and hazardous chemical wastes from the laboratories. The college takes maximum effort to minimize solid wastes produced from the laboratories. For instance, the chemistry laboratory is implementing semi micro methods of analysis that significantly reduces the usage of chemicals during practical sessions.

College has plans to make the campus plastic free in the near future.

Liquid waste management

The major source of liquid waste is from toilets and laboratories. All these waste materials are drawn systematically to drains that are collected in septic tanks.

E-waste management

As our college is governed by state Government, the disposal of E – waste is the responsibility of the state government. College is regularly updating E- Waste to the Commissionerate office. The cartridges of printers are refilled outside the college campus. UPS Batteries are recharged and repaired by the suppliers.

The institute campus has developed a plastic free culture. College campus is declared as "No Plastic Zone". Volunteers and NSS students and institute staff wilfully working towards a plastic free campus. We plant trees in and around the institute campus with the help of NSS in every year in rainy season. Under NSS of the college students put up awareness posters on notice board on issues relating to conservation and protection of environment.

As per the guidelines of the university, administration and exam application are made online. Online transactions are made through IFMS and PFMS. Financial transaction to the extent of 100% is paperless while other administrative and academic transactions to the extent of 50%.

7.2 Best Practices

7.2.1 Describe at least two institutional best practices (as per NAAC Format)

Response:

Title of the Practice: "Rainwater Harvesting"

Objectives of the Practice:

- To save rain water from allowing it to run off
- To use rainwater for chemistry practical exercises
- To use rainwater for watering plants and trees in the campus

The Context:

- Rainwater harvesting is the accumulation and storage of rainwater for reuse on-site, rather than allowing it to run off.
- Rainwater can be collected from rivers or roofs, and in many places, the water collected is redirected to a deep pit (well, shaft, or borehole), a reservoir with percolation, or collected from dew or fog with nets or other tools. Its uses include water for gardens, irrigation, domestic use with proper treatment, etc.

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- The harvested water can also be used as drinking water, longer-term storage, and for other purposes such as groundwater recharge.
- One method of rainwater harvesting is rooftop harvesting. With rooftop harvesting, most any surface tiles, metal sheets, plastics, but not grass or palm leaf can be used to intercept the flow of rainwater and provide a household with high-quality drinking water and year-round storage.

The Practice:

- The College is situated in southern part of the Gujarat state. The region experiences heavy rainfall during monsoon every year.
- Therefore, college has established water storage system in backside of the college building and harvesting system in the form of water tanks. One method of rainwater harvesting is rooftop harvesting.
- Water from rooftop is collected to tanks via pipelines. There are four water tanks each having capacity of 5000 ltr. These water tanks are situated at ground floor of college building.
- There are two Chemistry Labs in college. Both Chemistry labs are situated on first floor of college building. Many Chemistry practical exercises required distilled water. And rainwater can be used for the same purpose.
- Harvested water is used at chemistry labs by pulling up it via water pumps. This water is used for Practical exercises in Chemistry labs and for watering plants and trees in the campus.
- This harvested water can be used throughout whole year.
- By using this practice, college can save its expenses towards distilled water purchase and this practice is found to be very tranquil, too.

Evidence of Success:

By using this practice, Results of Chemistry laboratory experiments are found to be accurate and precise same as using distilled water which is available in market at comparatively high rates this.

2. Title of the Practice: "Superstition Awareness Programme"

Objectives of the Practice:

Superstitions can be understood as a way of fixing beliefs – in the face of an on-going lack of control – by involving effectively untestable explanations. The explanations are untestable only in part due to their content: related social attitudes and available empirical capabilities also play a vital role. Importantly, untestability does not entail the lack of meaning but, rather, frees the meaning to be determined by the actual function of the practices related to the claim. This is particularly the case with religious practices, which differ from superstitious ones in that their effectiveness is also untestable. Science, as Haack suggests, is contrasted by its attitude to evidence and the focus on extending empirical capabilities. The scientific attitude trumps the alternatives in so far as an accurate comparison requires that the scientific attitude be adopted.

- To spread Superstition Awareness among villagers of nearby villages situated near Government Science College, Chikhli
- To show people science behind superstitious beliefs and to motivate them for thinking scientifically

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and logically

The Context:

- Superstition in India is considered a widespread social problem.
- Superstition refers to any belief or practice which is explained by supernatural causality, and is in contradiction to modern science.
- Some beliefs and practices, which are considered superstitious by some, may not be considered so by others. The gap, between what is superstitious and what is not, widens even more when considering the opinions of the general public and scientists.
- Superstitions are usually attributed to a lack of education. But in India educated people have also been observed following beliefs that may be considered superstitious. The beliefs and practices vary from region to region, with many regions having their own specific beliefs.
- The practices may range from harmless lemon-and-chilli totems for warding off evil eye to serious concerns like witch-burning. Some of these beliefs and practices are centuries old and are considered part of the tradition and religion, as a result introduction of new prohibitory laws often face opposition.

The Practice:

- Our College, Government Science College, Chikhli, Navsari is situated in southern region of Gujarat State and is surrounded by many villages. Though some of the villagers are educated, superstitious beliefs are still prevalent among them.
- The practice is to spread awareness among villagers, to show people science behind superstitious beliefs, and to motivate them for thinking scientifically and logically.
- In account of this matter, College organised a programme titled "Superstition Awareness"
- Mr Pragnesh, Scientist, Dharampur Science Centre, Valsad was invited for showing some demonstrations like sky show, constellation, surface of moon, direction identification etc.
- Mr Vivek Scientist, Dharampur Science Centre, Valsad gave lecture regarding superstitious beliefs and inform people about scientific reason and logic behind those beliefs. Some students of College also assisted during this programme.
- Government primary school was selected as the venue for this programme. This programme held at evening so school students and villagers could attend this programme as people from villages have work at their farms at daytime.

Various experiments were demonstrated and practiced by our students.

Evidence of Success:

By using this practice, we succeeded in changing mind of villagers, who had earlier believed in

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superstitions. Some of the villagers are our college students at present and this proves that people from
villages now want to be educated and join the modern and scientific mainstream for progress.

7.3 Institutional Distinctiveness

Response:

The college is situated in tribal area and hence it provides students from interior and tribal areas valuable opportunities for academic progression and excellence. Beyond academics the college also provides training and opportunity to aspiring athletes to excel in various sporting disciplines.

In the short and modest journey to fulfil these aspirations we have achieved a milestone in Mehul Anandbhai Pawar who got bagged the first prize in Archery at Khel Maha Kumbh 2017. We hope to provide better training to our young athletes to achieve success which was once beyond their limits.

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5. CONCLUSION

Additional Information:

The college located in tribal area. Among all students, more than 40 percent students are of ST category. Among all enrolled students, average 49 percent of female students are enrolled. The College has installed CCTVs in the campus. Out of 10 classrooms, 6 classrooms are equipped with projectors.

Concluding Remarks:

Institute has established water storage system having capacity of 20,000 Ltr. This water is used for Practical exercises in Chemistry laboratory as mineral free water. The college uses solar panels for production of Green energy. Capacity of solar panel is 37 kw. It produces more electricity than required by the institute. Institute has introduced 4 new programmes including M.Sc. Botany. Institute has started Finishing School for the development of soft skill in student. Every classrooms and seminar hall have WiFi facilities. Institute has conducted programmes for prevention of superstition in people of villages.

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
